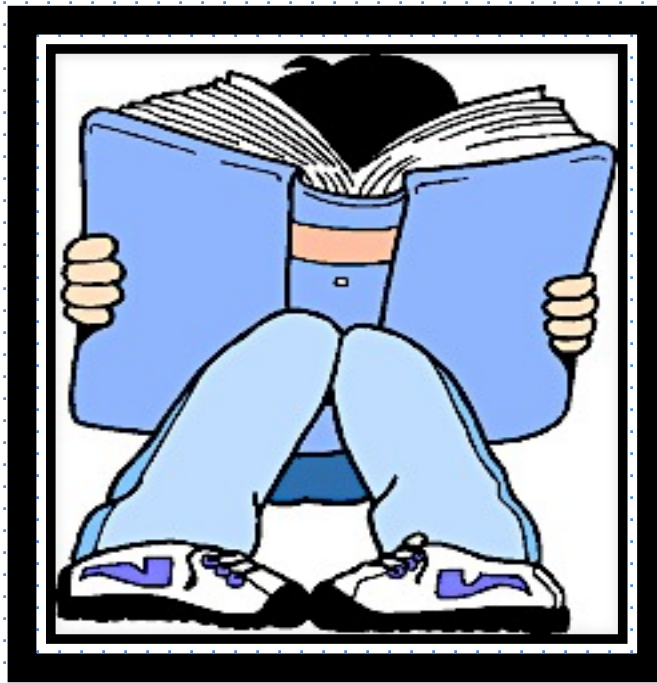

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Reader Response Report - Fiction

Directions: On a separate sheet of paper, answer all questions in complete sentences. Use textual evidence to support all responses.

- 1) What is the title?
- 2) Who is the author?
- 3) How many pages are in the text? How many pages did you read today?
- 4) How many chapters are in the text?
- 5) What is a new word you learned? Use it in a sentence:
- 6) Who is the main character or protagonist?
- 7) Describe the protagonist's physical traits.
- 8) Describe the protagonist's personality traits.
- 9) Describe the protagonist using three adjectives.
- 10) What is the protagonist's major conflict (problem) they are facing?
- 11) Predict how the protagonist will resolve their conflict.
- 12) What is the setting (time and place)? Could this story take place in another setting? Why or why not?
- 13) What is the genre (fantasy, romance, Sci-Fi, historical fiction, etc.)?
- 14) What is the theme or author's message?
- 15) Give a three-sentence plot summary of what you read.
- 16) Give the main character some advice on a problem they are facing.
- 17) Would you want the main character as a best friend? Why or why not?
- 18) Would you recommend this book to a friend? Why or why not?
- 19) Change the title to something different. Why did you choose this title?
- 20) What is the point of view? (First Person, Third Person Omniscient, Third Person Limited, etc.) Is this the best point of view to tell the story? Why or why not?
- 21) Give an example of how the protagonist's characterization revealed in the story (speech, action, personality traits, etc.)
- 22) Could this story actually happen? Why or why not?
- 23) What unanswered questions do you have about the story? Explain.
- 24) Copy an interesting/confusing/important/enjoyable quotation or passage and explain why you chose it.
- 25) How does the main character change or evolve in the story? Use specific details from the story to support your response.

- 26) What texts have you read that remind you of this story? Compare and contrast similarities and differences.
- 27) What surprised you the most about the story?
- 28) What question(s) would you ask the author?
- 29) Compare and contrast two different characters. How are they alike/different?
- 30) Discuss the first line. Is it an attention-grabber? What is its significance to the story?
- 31) How is the conflict resolved? Is the resolution a satisfying ending for the reader? Discuss.
- 32) What character would you most like to be? Why?
- 33) Discuss the motivations and actions of the antagonist. Were they moral, immoral, surprising, expected, etc.?
- 34) What do you think is the most significant scene in the book? Why?
- 35) Evaluate the book cover. Is it an effective design/illustration? Does it make you want to read the book? Why or why not?
- 36) Find examples of figurative language in the text. What images does it evoke? Is it effective? Why or why not?
- 37) List five words from the book that you find interesting or unfamiliar. Write their definitions and use them each in a sentence.
- 38) Discuss the tone (author's attitude) and mood (reader's emotional response) to the text.
- 39) If the author wrote a sequel, what would it be called?
- 40) What symbols were evident in the story? (Colors, seasons, animals, weather, elements, etc.)
- 41) Write a "book-fommercial" to convince or persuade others to read this book.
- 42) Write a poem about your book.
- 43) Write a eulogy (a speech honoring someone after death) for one of the characters.
- 44) Create a slogan for the book and explain why you chose this.
- 45) Create a theme song with lyrics for the book.
- 46) Write a letter to the author, protagonist, or antagonist of your book.
- 47) Make a comic strip story, (minimum of 3 frames)
- 48) Make a timeline of the events (minimum 5 events) in this story. You must illustrate each event and label each event with a caption or description.
- 49) You are a movie director. Cast the characters of your book with real actors/actresses. Justify why you chose them.
- 50) Write the first chapter of the sequel to your book.
